Welcome to the latest edition of the Rushcliffe Stakeholder Update. My name is Craig Berry and I am the officer responsible for the policing of Rushcliffe Borough.

Officers locally have been involved in the knife crime amnesty held at the end of September. A number of knives were handed into West Bridgford Police station.

We have also been using metal detectors in local parks such as Alford Road, Boundary road, West Park and The Hook at Lady bay, this was trying to locate concealed or dumped weapons in undergrowth. A machete was recovered in Edwalton and has been destroyed.

We are regularly asking for help from the public to identify suspects in crimes, we ask that you take time to look at these requests and contact us if you are able to identify anyone we wish to speak with, please follow the instructions on each request.

For some time, Nottinghamshire Police have been involved in discussions with local Cllrs. Neighbourhood watch groups and other residents around setting our priorities, which we will address over the following 3 months.

That process is changing and will now be known as Local Police Priority Setting (LPPS). I will now set 3 priorities, based on various types of information received, for Rushcliffe. However it is important that we continue to receive information from the local groups about the issues and concerns in their area. This will enable me to consider a wider range of information as possible for the priorities to be decided. The priorities will be fairly set across Rushcliffe.

Finally, I am pleased to advise that all front line officers, including those on Rushcliffe, are being given additional lifesaving training to deal with serious injuries. This includes training on how to use tourniquets and packing wounds to stop major bleeds which could help prevent fatalities while paramedics are travelling to an incident.

Each patrol vehicle will have a medical pack that are already placed in our response vehicles.

Team updates: West Bridgford

We continue to carry out work around the cycle thefts reported in the previous report and will continue to do so in the lead up to darker nights and the Christmas period.

On Tuesday 02/10/2019 Nottinghamshire Police executed a search warrant at an address in West Bridgford.

This was after a great deal of work by Notts Police intelligence unit and resulted in arrests being made along with seizure of drugs and property under the proceeds of crime act, enquiries are on-going by local CID officers.

Some good work was carried out on Monday 23/09/2019 with help from the pub watch scheme. A male was seen to enter the private staff area of a restaurant in West Bridgford and stole a handbag.

Details of the offender were circulated on the pub watch WhatsApp group. A member of that group was in East Leake later that day and saw the vehicle that the offender had been seen to get into at West Bridgford. A male was subsequently arrested in Leicestershire on suspicion of the burglary. Investigations are ongoing around this incident.

Our thanks go to the good work and prompt action f the Pub watch group.

There has been a good arrest in the Newark area recently as a result of a car being stopped by Nottinghamshire Police Officers, after a pursuit. An amount of catalytic convertors were found in the boot. Some arrests were made with those people detained being dealt with by our CID colleagues.

Pc Howard SHINN has met recently with Cllrs. WHEELER and BANSAL who cover wards in West Bridgford. This was to discuss how local Cllrs and the police can provide crime prevention advice and information around reporting incidents and crimes.

Rushcliffe south beat team officers attended a number of events on their beat areas in the last 2 weeks at the following locations

An open day at West Bridgford fire station.

Beat surgeries at East Leake, Keyworth and Cropwell Bishop. These surgeries are an opportunity to be available to residents to visit and speak with officers and discuss and local issues or concerns, they are advertised locally and on social media.

On the 21st of September officers attended the family day at the new DMRC (Defence Medical Rehabilitation Centre) at Stanford on Soar, again this was an opportunity to meet and engage with local residents.

We have also attended a NHW (neighbourhood Watch meeting) at East Leake on 01/10/2019. A guite well attended meeting where PCSO Tony Davies gave information about crime figures, crime prevention methods, reporting crimes using 101/999

A similar event held at Ruddington Methodist church which was attended by a ladies group.

Pc Howard SHINN attended the Wysall parish council meeting on 01/10/19; crime prevention advice was given along with details of links to the Nottinghamshire Police web site where a variety of information can be found https://www.nottinghamshire.police.uk/advice

We also attended the Radcliffe On Trent Parish Council meeting on 30/09/2019, where we spoke about the issues caused by the travellers who camped on the playing field on Bingham road at Radcliffe earlier this year.

On top of attending these events, officers will be patrolling the area prior and after the meeting.

We are aware of issues in the newly refurbished Cotgrave precinct, with some young people riding cycles and pulling wheelies in the car park and on the precinct itself, particularly near to the Co-Op shop. We will be paying attention to this in the coming days.
