







We are delighted to welcome Justina Harper who joins us this month as our new Litter Picker.



There has been a lot of outdoor shooting for Belvoir Archers with Club Nights of Tuesday and Thursday and Club day on Saturday being very busy.

Belvoir Archers did well in the Oregon Challenge (where Nottinghamshire and Oregon in USA compete against each other in two rounds) with three members being selected for the team: Bryan and Sue Haynes for Compound team and Martin Jones for the Longbow team.

On Saturday 17th June 2017 Belvoir Archers held a "Have a Go"

Archery session as part of the Barnstone and Langar Village Fete. We gave taster archery session to 19 people. We would like to thank Jodie Carter-Davies and everyone involved in a successful Fete.

The Nottinghamshire Archery County Championship in July saw four Belvoir Archers taking top places. Martin Jones won to retain his Nottinghamshire County Longbow trophy for the third year. Sue Haynes became the Lady Compound Champion, Richard Haydock became the Gentleman Compound champion and Paige





Jones became Junior Lady Compound Champion.

Saturday 22nd July 2017 saw the 4th Record status Windsor being held by Belvoir Archers.

There were 80 archers in attendance from across Nottinghamshire as well as from across the Midlands and Yorkshire. The weather was very sunny with a little breeze and the day went very well with 1 National Records being shot (subject to Ratification).

Martin and Vicky Jones successfully passed their level 2 archery coaching course.

In August saw the final of the Nottinghamshire League shoots. Belvoir Archers came away with several awards. Sue Haynes won the Ladies Compound on pure score and also was runner up on Handicap. Vicky Jones was the Ladies Compound handicap winner. Paige Jones came second in both the Junior Ladies Compound pure and Handicap score. Martin Jones was third in the gents Longbow on pure score. Belvoir Archers Compound team won the Compound Handicap trophy.

On 3rd September 2017 three Belvoir archers have been selected to shoot for Nottinghamshire in the East Midlands Archery Society Intercounties shoot: Sue Haynes, Richard Haydock and Martin Jones.

Belvoir Archers Winter Windsor is scheduled to take place on the 7th October 2017 and we already have a lot of interest in this competition. Start of November will see the club moving indoors to Cotgrave Leisure Centre where the indoor competition will commence where some of the head to heads from last year will be replayed.

The Club has also arranged for the use of Barnstone Village Hall on Tuesday evenings as well as Friday Evening and Some Saturdays for the Junior Club as well as training sessions for our members.

St Ethelburga's

A "Lost" Church Found!

In most books written on the Vale of Belvoir mention is made of the lost church of St Ethelburga's, a site for medieval pilgrimages. The authors usually speculate as to its location with Granby, Barnstone or Langar being possible sites. Following many years of research and on site visits by David Bate, Richard Pincott and their fellow Field Detectives the church is no longer lost. It is located about one mile south of Langar village in one of the fields farmed by John Parker at Hall Farm. Using metal detectors, collecting surface finds and archaeological techniques such as resistivity and magnetometry surveys, supplemented by old maps and documents, they have been able to not only locate the site but can also tell some of its story.


The site was occupied in the Iron Age before the Roman invasion of 43 A.D. and was probably a farm occupied by a family of some local standing. With the coming of the Romans the family obviously adopted the Roman

style of living as there is evidence of high quality Roman pottery and the building was roofed with ceramic tiles and slate as opposed to reeds or thatch. There was even under floor heating, a mosaic floor and possibly a bath house. Roman coins have also been found.

At the end of the Roman occupation the site seems to have been abandoned for several hundred years until a church was built in the Saxon style some time after

875. By 1140 the church had become one of the properties owned by Thurgaton Priory and it was under this ownership that the church became site for pilgrimages. Evidence of the pilgrims eating and drinking during their visits is easily found in the large number of animal bones and broken jugs, pots and mugs scattered around the site. All this came to end with the Reformation and the closing of the monasteries by Henry V111. The church fell out of use and gradually disappeared into the soil until its rediscovery.

The Field Detectives have kindly created a display board for the Parish and are

willing to provide some of the items found to be put on display. If possible these will be located in St Andrews to tell the story of the site and of continuous Christian worship in the Parish from the 9th Century onwards.

John Parker is keen to know more about the site. This can only be achieved by a supervised archaeological dig. It is early days, but the possibility of a community dig involving people from the Parish is being considered subject to funding being available. Watch this space!

A Hero of Cambrai



Sam Baxter is notable amongst those from Langar and Barnstone who served in World War One in that he received an award for bravery in addition to his campaign medals. He was awarded the Military Medal for actions he performed during the Battle of Cambrai in 1917.

Sam was the son of Thomas and Sarah Ann Baxter of Barnstone. He was born on 25th January 1892 and was baptised with the name Sam, not Samuel, on 20th March 1892 at St Andrew's, Langar, although most records show him as Samuel. Thomas was a Limestone Quarryman and his and Sarah Ann's other children were Edward, Thomas, George and Sarah Jane.

Initially Sam worked in farming taking milk deliveries to Barnstone Station. It is not known for whom Sam was working at this time but by 1911 he was living at Barnstone Lodge and working as a Cow Man for George Wallwin.

On the basis of an article in the Grantham Journal of 23rd March 1918 about Sam's award of the Military Medal he would appear to have left farming as it stated that he had joined the Army whilst working at

the Barnstone Lime Works. Unfortunately Sam's Army Service Records have not survived but it has been possible to piece together some of the story from other records and information supplied by his son, Brian.

Sam's Medal Roll shows that he first served with 15th Battalion, Sherwood Foresters and the newspaper article suggests this would have been in 1915. At this time the battalion was a "Bantam" battalion which recruited men of between 5 feet and 5 feet 3 inches tall, who would otherwise have been too short for other battalions. After training in Yorkshire and on Salisbury Plain the battalion landed in France on 1st February 1916. In March

the battalion moved to Le Touret for instruction in trench work and would spend April and May in and out of the trenches in the Laventie and Neuve Chapelle sectors. The battalion's first serious action took



place on 30th May 1916 when the Germans opened up an intense bombardment at 19.20 hours just as relief by the 14th Battalion, Gloucestershire Regiment was taking place. The two

battalions endured casualties from the shelling and then had to fight off a determined infantry attack by the Germans. This was eventually successfully repelled and the line re-established but at the cost to the 15th Battalion of 10 men killed, 2 Officers and 30 Other Ranks wounded and 2 Officers and 30 Other Ranks Missing. It is most likely that Sam received his first wound in this fight, although the newspaper article states that it was in July in the Lens area. This cannot be true as by July the



battalion was on the Somme. Whatever the actual details, Sam was evacuated to the UK and treated for a throat wound at Netley Military Hospital, Southampton. It was from here that Sam's parents received notification that he was unlikely to survive and then received a further message saying "Baxter still alive"! Following treatment Sam was eventually passed fit for military

service and returned to serve in France with 2nd Battalion, Sherwood Foresters. In November 1917 the British Army



planned to launch a major attack in the Cambrai area using infantry supported by tanks. Such attacks had been tried on a smaller scale since September 1916, but hopes were high that this attack would break the stalemate of trench warfare and allow for a deep penetration of the German Lines. The attack would begin at 6.20 a.m. on 20th November.

The 2nd Sherwood Foresters were located in the Beaucamp sector of the front and were tasked with following the 9th Suffolks and their tanks in the assault on the German Front Line. Remarkable progress was made and at 9 a.m. a message was received from "C" Company that it had captured an officer and about 20 prisoners and 5 Machine Guns. "D" Company then carried out a bayonet charge killing 12 Germans and capturing a further 12. By the end of the day all objectives had been met or exceeded and the battalion had captured 10 Machine Guns, 4 Officers including a Regimental Commander and 290 Other Ranks at a cost of 1 Officer and 8 Other Ranks killed and 1 Officer and 30 Other Ranks wounded.

Some of these prisoners had been captured as a result of Sam Baxter's actions. Sam entered a German

stronghold near Ribecourt full of the enemy and effected the capture of 1 Officer and 40 Other Ranks. It was for this action that Sam was awarded the Military Medal.

After the initial success on the first day the British Army then had to fight off a determined German counter attack. In total the 2nd Sherwood Foresters remained in action in this battle for 22 days and was not relieved until 12th December. By this time most of the ground captured on the first day of the battle had been regained by the Germans.



In addition to his first wound Sam was to suffer two more. He was wounded in the upper arm and in the thigh, entitling him to wear three wound stripes. He also was promoted to Lance Corporal and then Corporal, the last rank at least twice, as on the first occasion he was only a Corporal for a day. Evidently he made the mistake

of celebrating his promotion with a drink or two and, being found under the influence of alcohol, he was demoted before he had had time to sew on his extra stripe.

He is also known to have served in the Reims area of France in 1918. To have done this he must have transferred to the 1st Battalion, Sherwood Foresters as this battalion was in action in this area during the German Spring Offensive on the Aisne from 27th May until 6th June 1918.

After the war Sam returned to Barnstone to work at the Cement Works, where he became a Shift Foreman. Here he suffered an accident to one of his eyes causing him to lose the sight in it. He received compensation for this but lost this when his sight improved slightly! In total he completed 47 years service at the works.

In 1921 Sam married Fanny Carlile. Tragedy would strike Sam and Fanny during World War Two with the loss of one of their sons. A.C. 2 John Samuel Baxter, Royal Air Force (Volunteer Reserve) was killed in action on 20th February 1944. John was a Wireless Operator on board HMS LST-305, a Landing Ship - Tank, heading towards the beach at Anzio, Italy. At 17.55 hours on 20th February 1944, the German submarine, U-230, fired one torpedo at some landing ships off Anzio and heard a detonation after 13 minutes and 25 seconds. The torpedo probably detonated at the end of its run. At 18.51 hours, another torpedo was fired, which hit and sank HMS LST-305. John has no known grave and is commemorated on Panel 15, Column 2 of the Malta Memorial as well as the Langar & Barnstone War Memorial.

Sam Baxter died in 1960.





West Bridgford Shopmobility is a charity which helps people with mobility problems to enhance their quality of life; for an annual fee of just £10, it provides mobility aids (wheelchairs, walkers and scooters) to enable them to visit shops and places of interest in the central West Bridgford area.

However, over their 14 years of operation, needs have changed, and Shopmobility has broadened its range of services to operate a short-term hire scheme (payable weekly), so it's now possible to take a scooter or wheelchair home with you. Or indeed, away with you...

Look at the many benefits this provides:

Going on holiday in the UK?

You can hire a collapsible scooter, which can fit in the boot of a car (or the luggage compartment of a bus), so you can get around easily while you're away.



Guest with mobility problems?

If you have a visitor with mobility problems, we can provide you with a wheelchair or scooter for as long as you need it.

Been poorly, or just out of hospital?

If you've been ill, or broken a leg, or are recuperating after a hospital stay, we can get you out and about again.

Blue badges? You don't have to be registered as disabled to take advantage of the Shopmobility service; scooters are fully insured, and you'll be given full training on how to use them.

The typical cost for the weekly hire of a lightweight scooter is just £30 for members, plus a refundable deposit.

West Bridgford Shopmobility is open Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays between 10am and 2pm, and you're welcome to drop in to their office behind West Bridgford Library and chat to one of the volunteers.


