We are on the fourth year of our internal competition with an indoor knockout tournament, which is currently on the head-to-head quarter-final stage.

For this year, we have undertaken the Compound Ladder, where the archer can challenge the archer above them. There have been lots of challenges and rounds shot.

On 26 December, several club members and a guest braved the rain and cold to shoot the Moose Frostbite. As you can see the archers were well wrapped up. Luckily the rain stopped for the awards to be handed out on the field. The Moose Trophy was awarded to Sue Haynes for

obtaining her Master Bowman this year and all her work behind the

The Visitor Award and the Compound Award went to the Nottinghamshi re Archery Society Chairman Bernie Dicks, whilst the Recurve Award went to John Johnson and the Longbow Award to Sheila

Worth.

On Saturday 11 April 2020, Belvoir Archers will be hosting our World Record Status Double 720 shoot which now has limited spaces. Entries have been received from as far away as Guernsey as well as from the members of the present GB Squad.

Our Summer and Winter Windsor shoots take place on 18 July and 19 September respectively. Our Summer Windsor has been given National Record Status. We are still the only Record Status Windsor shoots in the Midlands, if not the country, and we have already received entries for both competitions.

Belvoir Archers are just putting the finishing touches to our next beginners' course for May 2020 as well as have-a-go sessions on the last Thursday of each month between May to August. The beginner courses are 4x3-hour sessions and the have-a-go

sessions are 2 hours. Both are led by Level 2-Qualified ArcheryGB coaches.

As I write this the wind is howling, the rain is lashing against the window and playing bowls in the warm summer sunshine seems a million miles away. However, preparations for the season are already underway. A few repairs are needed on the green surrounds, a new memorial seat wants installing and we intend to repair the external render on the clubhouse and redecorate if the lousy weather ever lets up.

Last season was a success both on and off the bowling green. We reached the semi-final of The Belvoir League Knock-out Cup, finished second by just one point to Bingham in the Nottinghamshire Bowls Federation Saturday League Division One, reached the final of the all-Nottinghamshire knock-out competition known as the Steele Trophy but lost to Kirkby-in-Ashfield and narrowly won the Third Division of the League of Country Bowling Clubs by one point seeing off St James' Park.

Recruitment over the last couple of years has brought some new members into the Club who seem to be enjoying the friendliness and welcome given to them. Some are beginners who are looking forward to some coaching and practice at the beginning of the season; others are more experienced, wanting to compete for places in the League teams.

Alternatively, the pre-season meeting is being held in the Clubhouse at 7.30pm on Wednesday 11 March. Just turn up. There are bowlers of all levels of ability in the Club. Some of our members join so they can just organise and enjoy a game among themselves. The choice is yours.

News from the Parish Council

Hello all. Here's the latest from the Parish Council.



Village Hall. As many of you will know by now, Rushcliffe Borough Council have approved our application to demolish and re-build the village hall. The next stage in this process will be to take the scheme to a more detailed specification and then seek competitive tenders for the delivery of the project from local contractors. This will assist in firming up the overall budget for the project, whilst also considering funding streams, and discussions with several bodies have already started. Watch this space!

Langar Village Pond. Steered by Cllr. Adrian Bellamy, an enthusiastic group of volunteers have turned the village pond in Langar into a wildlife haven, complete with path, benches and wetland area. We now await the Spring display of shrubs and bulbs planted just before Christmas. Our thanks to the Wildflower Farm for their support with this.

Following a successful application, the Woodland Trust has approved our request for hedgerow saplings to be planted in March, to define the space and separate it from the pub car park; a working party will be required to assist with this planting nearer the time.



Barnstone Play and Gym Area. Following community feedback, and with the active involvement of interested residents, the Parish Council is in discussion about upgrading the facilities at the children's' play area and adults' outdoor gym. The aim is to make the play area a more interesting and challenging experience for all those who use the equipment.

Parish Clerk. Last, but not least, is the news that Claire Pegg, our Parish Clerk, will be retiring at the end of April. We all owe Claire a big debt of gratitude for her many years of service in, and enthusiasm for, the role. Recruitment for her replacement is currently underway.

Vale Arts Group January 2020.

A good start to 2020, a new member already; welcome, Bryan Roe, hope you will be happy with us.

The Annual General Meeting went off very well and was over in no time as it all flowed very efficiently and the current Chair (Nicky Pulford), the Secretary (Gillian Clarke) and the Treasurer (Philip Clarke) were all able to stand again and were voted in by majority. The Financial report was accepted, as were the minutes of the previous AGM.

So........... 2020! What are we planning?

Our first demonstration was by our very own Cyril Richardson on acrylics on 28th January. We used either a board or a canvas, which Cyril supplied, and then he set about showing us how to put the acrylic paints onto the surface and start make a picture.

We started off with grey – load the brush with white and a touch of black, now spread it all over the canvas. The colour isn't even, it isn't supposed to be, but background done. Darken the corner with a touch more black (storm clouds?).

Next change the brush, load it with white again and make some stripes to indicate trees, don't forget peripheral, smaller, higher going back. Pick up a metal or plastic palette knife, dip the edge in the black and touch the edge of the white tree and drag across - voila bark! Branches, white again and line faintly with black. Now the lady, she is wearing a scarlet dress and has black hair and you can see her arms, no face. Arms first orange/white = flesh, dress scarlet and just a few black lines lightly to show folds, now her hair flowing down her back! Wow!!! Well done alll



I think we all achieved what Cyril asked for and although no two were the same, the picture is a lady in a red dress in birch forest, our very own interpretations.

We have nothing yet for February, but something might just turn up. On 17 March Julie Powel is coming to give us a workshop on Colour Theory and Practise in Acrylics. We intend to have a couple/few Exhibitions during 2020, and will advise accordingly.

Langar cum Barnstone War Memorial, St Andrew's Churchyard, Langar

The Parish Council has been informed by Historic England that the War Memorial has been granted Grade II Listed status by the Secretary of State for Digital, Culture, Media & Sport. Its List Entry Number in the List of Buildings of Special Architectural or Historic Interest is 1467423. The List entry for this building, together with a map, has now been published on the National Heritage List for England and is available for public access.





Update

Progress since the last update

The new year has seen us commence our training in pottery identification. To support this we have invested in reference materials and extra storage to create a project reference collection to help is in identifying our existing finds and any arising from our future field work. We also hope to create a small collection of pottery finds for Langar School to support the Roman and Saxon section of the History Curriculum.




Pottery identification in progress.

We have also completed our search of items listed in the county Historical Environment Record (HER) and marked these on our area map. We are expecting to add to this with new records after the talk to be given by the Nottinghamshire HER Officer at one of our meetings in February.

Geoff Kimbell has obtained the geophysical data from the archaeological survey carried out ahead of the construction of the Langar Lane Solar Farm and plotted this along with the data for the St Ethelburga site. The Solar Farm data has been interpreted as a Romano-British settlement and there are similarities with those of St Ethelburga's, albeit being more extensive.

Next Steps

The NLHF funding covers our activities until the end of August this year. To enable to continue we have applied the The Nineveh Trust for funding for the following activities:

- 1. Conduct archaeological research via field-walking, geophysics and topographical surveys
- 2. Conduct landscape studies into the Roman settlement and road systems
- 3. Undertake further documentary and archival research to compliment the fieldwork
- 4. Pay for specialists and professional training for project members
- 5. Compile professional archaeological reports to be made available to the wider public
- 6. Host a number of public outreach events
- 7. Provide further educational sessions for the local school
- 8. Contribute to the regional Historic Environment Record More news in the next issue of Signpost.

Your Help is Required

We know that the St Ethelburga site was partially excavated in 1959 to 1961 by a Mr Herbert Houldsworth. Unfortunately he appears to have not published his results. Does anyone remember the dig taking place and have any information to share?

We also believe that during the time that Mr Gwilym Lewis was Headmaster of Langar School a number of excavations around the village were carried out by pupils under his supervision, possibly in the 1970's or 1980's. We would love to hear from anyone who could confirm this, especially if you were involved.
