The Latest from your Parish Council

Remembrance Sunday

Cllr. Nicky Pulford represented the Parish Council at the services at the 207 Squadron Memorial and at Langar Parish Church, during which a wreath was laid in remembrance of parishioners who gave their lives for their country in time of war.

Precept for 2024 - 2025

At its meeting in January, the Parish Council formally ratified the sum of £45,630 as its required budget (the 'precept') to provide parish services for the coming year. As ever, the guiding principles used in our discussions were those of trying to maintain support for the amenities and activities that contribute to our strong community spirit, whilst being aware of the need for financial restraint, particularly at the present time.

This budget requirement represents an increase of only 0.5% on the previous year (last year was 6.7%), and this increase is driven by four elements: increased salary costs for our staff, increased costs for our external

services, to provide support for the upkeep of the war memorial in St. Andrew's churchyard and to initiate an annual pruning of the fruit trees in the community orchard.

Could YOU be a Parish Councillor?

The Parish Council has vacancies for three councillors. Could you be one of these?

This worthwhile and satisfying role puts individuals at the heart of their community, giving a local voice on planning applications and supporting neighbourhood ventures which aim to strengthen local cohesion. The councillors also act as a corporate sole trustee of the hall charity (see elsewhere in this issue) and so oversee the maintenance and running of the hall for the benefit of the local community. 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New Community Hall

On the 1st of December 2024 the builders of the new community hall represented by Mr Stewart Bloodworth, of W.R. Bloodworth & Sons Ltd, having first met all of the criteria set by the local authority planners, handed over the keys of the completed hall to Councillor Jeffrey Fry, Chairman of the Community Hall Charity Trust.



New Hall

In October 2022 the trustee body, having approved the plans and design of the new building developed by Welham Architects, then approved Mrs Jane Welham as the appointed project manager.

A slight hold-up at the beginning meant that the trust had to pay for the removal of bats which were sheltering in the foyer of the old hall.

The work commenced in removing all of the equipment stored in the old hall and the user groups all arranged for their materials to be stored locally; the main bulk of the remaining equipment was then taken into storage at **Rock Civils** free of charge and placed in their on-site warehouse for which everyone is extremely grateful.

The demolition of the old building then commenced, leaving a big clear area which at the time looked really strange.

January 2023

Bloodworths then fenced off the area and commenced the cleanup and the groundwork. This was followed by a couple of weeks of really bad weather which led to a few delays.

By the end of January the building work gathered apace with the installation of the steel works.



April 2023

In April 2023 the main brickwork structure of the new building was well underway and the hall user groups purchased a sealable time capsule and added a lot of information about the hall, the villages and the user groups. The then Mayor of Rushcliffe Councillor Combellack then planted the capsule in the wall.

May to November 2023

Over the next few months, as the work continued, the trustee body met on a regular basis to discuss and agree on many different requirements. The Chair of the trustee body attended many meetings with the architects and builders to discuss various items and gain approval for the work carried out to date and approve any additional requirements.

The Results



The net result of all the hard work has been to produce an absolutely stunning building both inside and out that has added a really lovely asset to the Langar and Barnstone communities.

It is already being put to good use by the local community, with previous users returning and new users coming forward.

Since the initial idea to replace the village hall a lot of work has been carried out to find and receive funding to help the trustee body with the cost of the rebuilding work. Inside Local Businesses

The Unicorn's Head in Langar village takes on a new lease of life



In September 2024 a new team, led by Andy Hunt and Leroy Ambrose-Allen, along with Simon Barnes as general manager, decided to take on the lease of the Everard's Public House in Langar village. Their aim was to turn it into a gastro pub with great food and drinks at reasonable prices which could be enjoyed by the local community as well as outside visitors.

The Unicorn's Head

The village pub has had a mixed history recently since the large fire in April 2015 which caused so much damage, and its subsequent total refurbishment. This wasn't helped by the Covid lockdown, the appointment of various managers, mixed opening times and a number of closures meaning that the public had lost confidence in visiting the pub.

However Andy, Leroy and Simon are all local to the area and Andy, who was brought up in Cropwell Bishop, has had thoughts of running the Unicorn for some time and was intent on providing sustainability to the Unicorn's Head. Andy, Leroy and Simon have all been in the pub and restaurant industry around

the Nottingham area and they worked together in the Wollaton Pub and Kitchen with Andy and Simon as General Managers and Leroy as Head Chef before deciding to team up together to lease the Unicorn's Head.

The History of the Unicorn's Head

The pub is a listed building and after the fire it had been beautifully restored so when Andy, Leroy and Simon took over, they only needed to close for the first month whilst they carried out internal redecoration and the repolishing of the floors before rearranging the interior to their specific requirements.



Their whole aim is to bring the local village pub back to life and, since opening, they have been very pleased with the response so far, especially in the restaurant.

They are looking forward to the springtime when they can start to serve drinks and food outside either at the front or the back gardens.

Restaurant

Speaking to Leroy, the head chef, he stated that his aim is to produce classic pub meals with a slight twist adding his own influences to the menu.

They aim, as much as possible, to source food and ingredients locally. Operating within the so-called 'Stilton Triangle' there are a great number of local companies supplying meat, bread, fruit, vegetables and cheese. The only exception is the fish which has to travel slightly further.

All of the puddings are made in-house. They can cater for a wide range of visitors and they offer special menus at different times along with the a la carte menu. They can even offer special requests for parties.



Villagers' Evening

To celebrate their opening they held an open evening on 17 October 2023 for all the local villagers when they offered free champagne and nibbles to everyone who visited. It was very well attended and the whole place was full!



Local Market

In addition, they are running a local market in the front car park on the last Saturday of every month where local artisan suppliers are showing their products and the pub is offering breakfasts and coffee at the same time.

Save the Swifts

A motion passed at a Rushcliffe Full Council Meeting recently made national headlines. The motion to install swift nesting bricks in new homes was passed unopposed at a meeting of the full council.

A report by George Torr, BBC News, East Midlands said 'A council has pledged to make at least 50% of homes on new developments include 'swift bricks'



Rushcliffe Borough Council said installing the bricks, which have small holes in, would encourage the endangered bird to nest in new communities. The bricks are designed to allow small birds to access a space to nest.

Deputy council leader Abby Brennan said the move "has the potential to halt the decline of swifts".

The decision will now be attached to all relevant planning permissions for new buildings granted in Rushcliffe under laws that support the environment.

Councillors also supported a requirement for new commercial and

industrial developments to have a minimum of three swift bricks installed per unit. The council is now reviewing where the bricks can be added to its own existing buildings.

Here is an example of a swift brick - the RSPB say they can also help other wildlife, including red-listed species like house sparrows, starlings and house martins.



The RSPB said swifts like to live in houses and churches, squeezing through tiny gaps to nest inside roofs but as more old buildings were renovated and gaps in soffits closed up, swift nest sites were fast disappearing.

Swifts were added to the red list, which is the highest conservation priority with species on this list needing urgent action, in 2021.

Flooding

I just wish to thank all those who helped in flooded areas. There was an enormous coordinated response to flooding. Councillors, officers and outside agencies were working round the clock to ensure everyone's safety.

A very prompt cleanup operation also went into action.

As a reminder, training is available from the County Council for those who wish to be flood wardens. Having trained wardens in your community is an enormous help when these situations strike. Please contact your Parish Council and myself if you would be willing to become a Flood Warden.

Financial help will be available for those who were flooded.

1. Flooded households in eligible affected areas, who can apply for up to £500 cash to help with immediate costs.
2. Households and businesses significantly affected, who will be eligible for 100% Council Tax and business rates relief for at least three months.
3. Small-to-medium sized businesses in eligible affected areas, who can apply for up to £2,500 from the Business Recovery Grant to help them return quickly to business as usual.
4. Eligible flood-hit property owners, who can apply for up to £5,000 to help make their homes and businesses more resilient to future flooding via the Property Flood Resilience Repair Grant Scheme.
5. Farmers who have suffered uninsurable damage to their land will be able to apply for grants of up to £25,000 through the Farming Recovery Fund towards repair and reinstatement costs for farmers adversely affected by exceptional flooding.

Every year I receive £1000 in grant monies to be distributed for various community initiatives. We are coming to the end of the Council Financial year so would welcome any requests as soon as possible. I always like to allocate my fund as it can help many village causes.

Upper Broughton History Group Laptop for archives £423.50 to help record details of historic documents found in a village outhouse. The documents when fully translated from the Old English and Latin appear to go back to the 16th century.



About the Community Support Scheme
The Council has a Community Support Scheme which enables each Councillor to put forward proposals for expenditure on small projects in their ward or community. Each Councillor currently has a budget of £1,000 each year to spend.

What this grant **can** be spent on:
Improvements to community facilities within the ward

- Community events or activities within the ward that benefit all/a wide range of residents of the ward
- Investment in community infrastructure within the ward
- Support to a religious organisation where the project/event to be delivered benefits the wider ward (for example, repair of church clock)
- Support to a local school or academy where the project/event to be delivered benefits the wider ward
- Section of the community within the ward with a specific need.

What this grant cannot be spent on:

- Anything illegal
- Projects of a party-political nature, including supporting political organisations
- Supporting religious groups, activities or events, where the benefit is for that group only.
- Requests which directly benefit a sole individual
- Requests spent on consumables
- Support to lobbying or campaign groups
- The direct employment costs of staff or hospitality payments (including food and drink)

- Anything that will bring the Council into disrepute or damage the Council's reputation

A Community Support Scheme Application Form must be completed by the applicant and the councillor, and should include written evidence from the applicant outlining what the money is to be used for. Completion of the online form is preferable although you can also download a pdf copy to print out. Printed forms should be returned to the Business Support Unit. The grant is usually paid by BACS transfer

Town and Parish Forum

RCAN are currently planning the spring forum which is taking place at Rushcliffe Arena on Friday 22 March 2024 from 0930 – 1230. Agenda to follow and the theme is Governance. Kaffy Rice-Oxley, CEO of Nottingham ALC (Association of Local Councils), will be providing an update on the following:

- Code of Conduct – importance of adopting LGA CoC as recommended by NALC & overview
- Civility and Respect Pledge – creating a positive environment so that conflicts don't arise
- Policies – a list of the documents (templates available from Notts ALC) to set you up for success and prevent issues emerging
- Local Council Award Scheme – scheme to support the council's ongoing development

Gemma Dennis, the Borough Solicitor, will also be attending and she will cover

- Declarations of Interest, recognising the different categories of interest which need to be declared.

- Standards complaints – explaining the process for considering a complaint, the options for resolving a complaint and potential sanctions

This is an important meeting and I urge as many Councillors as possible to attend – it is not just the content of the meeting but the networking which is invaluable.

OUR FACILITIES

Langar cum Barnstone Community Hall is a warm and welcoming venue for all occasions, ideal for regular group bookings, meetings, business or training events, celebrations or shows.

Main Hall

Our main hall is 100m square, accommodating up to 200 people standing and 96 people seated. The Stage area is 24.5m square and can accommodate 45 people standing and 24 people seated. We have a portable stage with PA and lighting system. A projector and large projection screen are also available for use.

Meeting Room


Our meeting room is 15m square and can accommodate 10-12 people seated.

Kitchen

Our large galley kitchen has two serving hatches which open on to the Main Hall. Two four-ring ceramic hobs with extractor fans above, two double ovens with grill, a microwave, two fridges and a glass dishwasher. A wall-mounted water boiler is available for hot drinks.

Toilets

Our spacious and decorative male and female toilets are easily accessible. There is a separate wheelchair-accessible toilet with baby changing facilities.



Rushcliffe Villages Community Safety Reports

At a recent meeting of the Rushcliffe villages' parish councillors, together with local police officers and other involved groups, a report was submitted on local crime around the villages. Inspector Tim Cuthbert reported on neighbourhood policing around the villages.

Motor Vehicles

There have been a number of thefts of cars which have keyless entry fobs. It was reported that it was possible for criminals to buy "scanners" on the Internet which they can then stand near the entrance to homes and scan for key fobs. Once located they can then use the scan to unlock cars and drive them away without any damage to the vehicles. The first the owners know is that their car is missing the next morning.

Recommendations

It is recommended that on returning home with your car, place the key fob, along with the spare key, in a so called "faraday cage," a small special box or pouch which can be purchased online fairly cheaply.

Alternatively, if you have an empty metal box this would have the same effect. In addition, another deterrent is the old-fashioned steering lock which provides a visual deterrent.

Domestic Burglary

There has been an increase in domestic burglaries in some villages around the area, often instigated by door to door sellers who are not genuine. Residents are asked to call **101** if they are visited by such people; this allows the police to

build up a better picture of these activities and take appropriate action.

Rural Crime

The police and the local farm watch group have been proactive in visiting all the farms in the area to discuss security and a Farm WhatsApp group has been formed to report suspicious activity.

This has resulted in a number of arrests and convictions in the area which has contributed to a reduction in thefts.

Rushcliffe Borough Council

Judith Brown from Rushcliffe Borough Council announced a number of activities in the area. These include the 'Ask for Angela' initiative which is aimed at reducing violence against women and is to be rolled out in the villages.

This involves placing notices in pubs and clubs around the area and the training of staff to know how to take action if a member of the public approaches them and asks to speak to Angela.

Security Cameras

The inspector stated that doorbell cameras and property security cameras help them in solving crimes in the area and they are going to place additional security cameras in and around Bingham.

Nottingham Alerts

Finally, the inspector announced the use of the new Nottinghamshire Alerts System which is coming online and all residents are asked to go online and register their email address so they can then be informed of announcements and alerts relating to activities in the region.

Community Speed Watch

During 2024 a number of volunteers put themselves forward to train as operators of the Community speed watch system sponsored by the Parish Council and Nottinghamshire Constabulary.



Following on from the training and after the police risk assessed various places in the two villages, a number of Speedwatch sessions were held.

Speeding vehicles' details were recorded and the drivers were sent warning letters from the police.

The Parish Council would like to thank those volunteers for all their efforts during the year and we will restart the sessions in the spring once the weather and the light has improved.

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


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
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
