Remembrance ceremonies

The Parish Council was represented by Cllr. Nicky Pulford at the ceremonies at the 207 Squadron Memorial and at St. Andrew's Church, Langar, on Remembrance Sunday.

The Parish Council takes great pride in its stewardship of the 207 Squadron Memorial at Langar Airfield and wishes to acknowledge the fine efforts of its staff and of Andy Dunlop Gardening Services in maintaining the Memorial, especially in the run-up to the Remembrance ceremonies.

Village Hall re-development

The Parish Council has donated £40,000 from its earmarked reserves to the Langar-cum-Barnstone Village Hall Charity to support its plan to re-build the Village Hall.

Responsible dog ownership in public places

The Parish Council is regularly informed of instances of dog fouling within the parish. These are all noted but the Parish Council has limited scope to respond to these comments. Accordingly, the Parish Council has indicated its support for a new initiative from Rushcliffe Borough Council on "potential updated laws to help promote more responsible dog ownership in the Borough focusing on dog fouling in public places and keeping a lead on pets in designated areas".

Rushcliffe Borough Council is now asking for views in a short five-minute survey (https://bit.ly/3pXvNW6) until December 16 on a proposed Dog Control Public Space Protection Order that could come into operation for three years from next April.

C28 footpath

The grass verge on the C28 between Langar Woods and Coach Gap Lane is a regular walking route for many residents out on their daily constitutional and for getting to work at the businesses on the industrial park. The Parish Council have now presented suggestions to Nottinghamshire County Council for a footpath on the verge to provide a better walking surface for residents.

If you think this is a good idea, please contact us to provide further support for our proposal.

Boundary changes

The Boundaries Commission has long since divided us between two wards within Rushcliffe for the purposes of borough and county councillors. They have now proposed that we will in future be divided between two members of parliament.

The Parish Council has registered its preference for the parish to be a single entity and will work to ensure Langar cum Barnstone continues to be one united parish, including not just the two villages, but the whole community and all the businesses.



Fundraising continues apace

The three months since we last reported to you have seen further progress in our fundraising efforts.

The Sole Trustee has submitted a grant application for £90,000 to Tarmac Landfill Communities Fund, and a decision is expected shortly. Another application has been submitted to the Bernard Sunley Foundation; the amount awarded (if successful!) is determined by the Foundation, typical sums for other village halls being in the region of £5,000 - £10,000. The Parish Council is also awaiting a decision on its application for a £15,000 grant from the Rushcliffe Borough Council Capital Grant scheme.

The Parish Council has donated £40,000 from its earmarked reserves to assist with the rebuild programme.

So, where are we up to with the fundraising? Read on...

The lowest tender quote received for the re-build last August was in the region of £535,000, and, given the volatility in the construction industry and the increases in cost of materials, we consider a sum of £550,000 to be a realistic re-build cost to be working towards.

The Public Works Loan of £400,000 has been approved, and that together with the £40,000 from the Parish Council provides 80% of our target figure. Should all the current grant applications be successful, that will provide the final 20%.

However, there is no guarantee that we will be successful with all (or any!) of the grant applications, and we continue to place great emphasis on securing strong community support for the re-build. To that end, we have sent out letters to all the local businesses in the area asking if they would be able to offer some financial support and we are very encouraged with the support already received or pledged from John Deere Ltd, Mainline Mouldings, Skydive Langar, Langar Woods, Vale Market Café and the Art Group. The 'Buy-a-Brick' scheme open to residents and local small businesses mentioned in the previous issue of Signpost will be launched in the New Year.

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BLIND VETERANS UK

As we paused on Remembrance Sunday last month to remember the extraordinary bravery of past and present servicemen and women, it made me think even more of the charity for which I am lucky enough to be a trustee. The charity is Blind Veterans UK (formerly St Dunstan's) which is a large British charity providing free support and services to vision-impaired ex-Armed Forces and National Service personnel.

The charity was founded in 1915 by Sir Arthur Pearson - who had himself lost his sight to glaucoma - to help British soldiers returning from the front lines during the First World War who were suffering from blindness, especially from mustard gas attacks. Sir Arthur established a hostel where the servicemen were trained to go on and lead productive lives so that they would not have to depend on charity. The charity helps rebuild lives after sight loss through rehabilitation, training, practical advice and emotional support.

Over a hundred years later, the charity is still going strong because our service personnel are still dealing with conflicts around the world. The majority of our members are over seventy years of age but we have many younger members too, with one being only nineteen years old!

With this in mind, it's worth taking a moment to reflect on how important our sight is and how we take it for granted. With Christmas just around the corner, think of all the things we look forward to seeing - trees covered with sparkling snow, Christmas lights in windows, the happy faces of children opening their presents, twinkling Christmas trees. Now think of a world of darkness where these things aren't visible, but Blind Veterans UK offers a light in the darkness.

Remote Letter Box Theft

At a recent meeting held in Bingham between local parish councillors and the local police, it was reported that there had been some thefts from post boxes that were remote from people's front doors i.e. attached to garden fences etc.

Whilst helpful to the household and the postman, it seems that many of these boxes are not locked and secure.

It was reported that thieves have been watching the postman leave items in the

boxes and then stealing items such as credit cards and valuables before the occupant has time to retrieve the items.

The police have recommended that people in rural areas add a lock of some description to their remote letter boxes to deter thefts.

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Autumn / Winter in the Farming Community

The autumn is a very busy time of year for local farmers, as this is when the majority of crops for next harvest are established. The autumn of 2021 has been relatively kind, especially taking into account the previous two years. In fact, establishment conditions have been as near to perfect as I can remember, with adequate moisture and heat to gets crops growing fast without too much rain that it has adversely affected establishment. Prices for nearly all agricultural commodities are at record highs, which is a double win as we're looking at well-established crops which can be forward sold at record prices.

However, agricultural inflation is rising rapidly, with one national agricultural supply company putting the rate on inflation on agricultural inputs at 22% increase in the year to September 2021. The rise in natural gas value making fertiliser production more costly and chemical production being delayed as China and India struggle to get going again after COVID-19 are largely to blame. If you look at the sale price of wheat over the same period, it has only risen by 6% YOY so the net margin for the farmer is constantly being squeezed. In theory, food prices should be rising to counteract this effect but the supermarkets continue to be consumer-focused, thus pricing domestic food production out of contention compared to imported goods from destinations growing raw ingredients far cheaper than we can produce ourselves due to factors such as using chemicals that are banned in the UK and cheaper labour. Couple this with the loss of agricultural support payments (subsidies) from leaving the EU over the next few years, the net effect on domestic food supply is that farmers need to find innovative ways to reduce costs and maintain their margin. But with 'agflation' rising faster than sales values, this is impossible.

Interestingly as a side note, you may have noticed in the news that the price of natural gas got so expensive in the autumn that the UK manufacturer of nitrogen fertiliser had to stop production as the costs were making it unviable. One of the by-products of the fertiliser manufacturing is the carbon dioxide gas and it was this shortage of by-product that the tabloid headlines focused on, as it impacted on supplies of fizzy drinks and beer – there was little to no mention of the shortage of the primary product (fertiliser) and the impacts that it could lead to with domestic food production for next harvest. The priorities seem a little confused there to me. Subsequently, fertiliser prices have risen to more than double what they were a year ago.

The COP26 summit recently drew to a close in Glasgow. I'm not sure what real conclusions were drawn but for me. the meat industry got an unfair amount of blame for greenhouse gas emissions so in an attempt to balance this view: Grass, the backbone of diets for ruminants (beef and sheep) in the UK grows freely and readily whilst also sequestering a significant amount of carbon. Grass-fed cattle and sheep like you see freely grazing around Langar-cum-Barnstone are not the evil villain of climate change that they are being made out to be. However, shipping in container loads of avocados or soybean oil that have been grown on land in South America that's been rainforest for centuries until it was all cut down to feed western diets is contributing to climate change without a doubt.

So, in the run up to Christmas, think about where your food is coming from and look to buy British where you can. Not only to safeguard domestic production, but also to reduce your individual carbon footprint. Do you need to include non-seasonal vegetables on your dinner table or can you substitute for something equally as delicious grown or produced in the UK? I wish you and your families a wonderful festive period.

I received an assurance from Inspector Lawton that speeding in rural areas would be addressed and that rural roads/lanes with 60 mph limits could be looked at; e.g. Hall Lane Colston Bassett, Clawson Lane, Hickling, C28 Langar, Station Road, Upper Broughton, Hickling Lane Kinoulton to name but a few.

In similar fashion to rewards points at retailers, all residents need to do is log their day to day activities that highlight how they are decreasing the amount of carbon they create, such as:

- Walking to work or school instead of taking the car
- Cycling or using public transport
- Putting your recycling bin out with all the correct recyclables
- Switching off a light or switch at home
- Taking a shower of four minutes or less and many, many more!

A full list of how you can redeem points is available on the app or at https://notts.greenrewards.co.uk/ and when you accumulate sufficient points, you can then earn the discounts, vouchers and prizes.

There's also £20 worth of vouchers for the top two residents in each council area who earn the most points each month, to claim at local businesses, donate to worthwhile causes or projects and in some districts and Boroughs there's prizes too for the top point-earning wards.

The mobile app lets people collect points for logging the fact they have done their recycling, walking instead of using a car, as well as doing quizzes to learn more about climate change.

One such independent retailer taking part is Slades Florist in West Bridgford.

Manager Joshua Slade says: "This helps support businesses, including those on Melton Road. You get 10% which helps you and helps us too."

Local Communities Fund:

(This will be replacing the County Council Local Improvement Scheme)

Eligible organisations can apply for one-off Capital grants up to a maximum of £20,000 per organisation in any funding year. These should serve or meet the following aspects:

- To address local priorities, e.g. improving access to new or existing services such as sports and leisure, protecting the environment, reducing loneliness, improving physical and mental health.
- To improve local places and spaces that are important to communities.
- To bring people together and involve them in the design and implementation.
- To help address climate and environmental change and/or minimise any negative impact on the environment.

I know that rural crime has been a concern to many communities across Rushcliffe, including in and around Langar and Barnstone. I will be working with Nottinghamshire Police and Nottinghamshire's Police and Crime Commissioner, to ensure that more police resources are spent tackling this issue.

I recently met with Chief Inspector Heather Sutton who is the rural crime lead for Nottinghamshire to highlight residents' concerns and to hear more about current operations to tackle crimes such as theft of farm machinery. Pet theft is one of the crimes that many people have written to me about following an increase in thefts over lockdown. I surveyed people across Rushcliffe and presented the results in Parliament to Ministers where I argued for a new offence that recognised pet theft as more similar to abduction of people than theft of property. I'm really pleased that the Government is now introducing a new offence of Dog Abduction in the Kept Animals Bill. Under current sentencing guidelines, pet



thieves rarely see a custodial sentence, but under this new measure criminals could face up to 5 years in prison.

Businesses like our local shops and pubs are often the centre of village life. I wanted to highlight these fantastic businesses, so I have launched my 'Best Pub in Rushcliffe' and 'Best Local Shop' competitions.
