

Comings and goings

Village Hall re-development

Planning approval has been granted for the re-development of the Village Hall, and tenders to carry out the re-build have been received, so the emphasis now is on securing the funding to allow this to go ahead. An application for a Public Works Loan is being prepared. Should this loan be approved, that will provide the bulk of the required funding, with the rest being found from various grants and local initiatives.

Langar cum Barnstone Parish Council -Chairman's Report

It has been a very challenging year for everyone around the world. The wide spread of the coronavirus at the outset of 2020 led to a nationwide lockdown, the closure of schools, businesses, leisure activities, community buildings and play parks.

I would like to thank all of the volunteers throughout the parish that rallied around to provide support and services during this extremely difficult time. Your contributions have been invaluable, and you have truly demonstrated what a fantastic community we live in.

As we approach the end of April 2021, I am optimistic for the future. The national lockdown appears to be lifting, and we can begin to get back to some sense of normality.

Throughout the year the Parish Council has continued to operate to the best of our ability. Monthly meetings have been held via video conferencing.

This report focuses on summarising those activities undertaken by the council during the last year.

Council Members

Cllr Jason Hollands resigned in December 2020. This left two open vacancies on the council. These vacancies were filled by co-option following interviews in March 2021. The new members to join the council were Cllrs John Crosby and James Barlow.

Council Staff

The Parish Council currently employs three part time staff, including the Parish Clerk, Lengthsman and Litter Picker. I am very grateful for all their hard work over the last year. It's a great team. They work extremely hard to keep our villages, services and administration in good working order.

Planning

The Parish Council acts as a consultative body for Rushcliffe Borough and Nottinghamshire County Council's Planning departments.

Each month, (excepting August), Parishioners have an open invitation to attend Council meetings, to share their opinions on planning and other matters. These open sessions last for fifteen minutes and help to inform councillors on public opinion.

Where the matter relates to planning, the parish is but one voice. We are not the decision makers, but our comments (along with those of other members of the public) might help to inform it.

Over the last year we have continued to review all local planning applications in the interest of the parish.

Facilities

The nationwide lockdown has restricted Parish Council income streams during the last year. This is understandable given that organisations haven't been able to use the village hall or outdoor sports facilities. The Parish Council has been working hard to minimise this impact and to ensure we can offer these facilities at the earliest opportunity.

Over recent years the Parish Council formed a Village Hall Development Committee. This committee continues to make steady progress with existing plans to build a new village hall facility to meet the growing needs of a busy, active, modern community. During the last year they commissioned surveys to understand community requirements. They have also been looking at funding streams to support the project.

We have completed the phase 1 re-build of the new children's play park area in the centre of Barnstone. I am delighted to report that funding for phase 2 of this exciting project has now been achieved. This now has the makings of a really wonderful play area for the children of the parish. I am very grateful for all the work of the Play Park Group and all the generous funding streams that have bought this project to fruition. The Parish Council has continued to provide the local structure for developing and maintaining public amenities such as our play parks, public spaces, war memorial areas and defibrillator machines.

We are proud to support community groups and events (where possible) to help foster inclusion and goodwill in our community.

I will be stepping down from the Parish Council in May after 4 years' service. During my time on the council I have learned a great deal about local government, planning and services. I am very grateful for the support of my fellow Parish Councillors and that of the Borough and County Councillors.

It has been a privilege serving the parish over the years and I wish my successors well in their future endeavours.

Well-being is defined by the Oxford English Dictionary as "the state of being comfortable, healthy, or happy." However, it is important to realise that well-being is a much broader concept than moment-to-moment happiness. The New Economics Foundation describes well-being as the following: 'well-being can be understood as how people feel and how they function, both on a personal and a social level, and how they evaluate their lives as a whole." Following a period of reflection, evaluation and improvement that has taken place since 2014, the staff at Langar Church of England Primary School have held the belief that children's mental health and well-being is the foundation on which academic success is built. We believe that ensuring our pupils are mentally well and emotionally stable allows them to flourish in all areas of the curriculum. As

a school we promote and cater for children's emotional well-being.

Our whole school culture and ethos, built on our core Christian values provides the sense of community needed to ensure children feel cared for, loved and respected. Our behaviour policy created around positive behaviour management and with clear guidance for the language and conduct to be demonstrated by adults, provides children with safe boundaries, clear expectations and a sense of fairness. Our community spirit and positive relationships fostered with parents allows for open lines of communication building trust and a sense of team around each individual child.

Classrooms have well-being areas set up with access to mindfulness and calming activities, essential oils and diffusers and visual reminders of the school values. First Aid Kit for Feelings boxes and Worry Monsters give children a tool to self-help when they want to express negative feelings and emotions. We have hosted yoga and mindfulness workshops and our broad curriculum allows every child the opportunity to flourish and discover who they are.

Such was our dedication and commitment to the well-being of our children that we invested in ensuring a member of staff was skilled-up and knowledgeable in this area. Mrs George trained as an ELSA - Emotional Literacy Support Assistant - three years ago and has, since then, undertaken training in Draw and Talk therapy as well as Mental Health First Aid. This, as we view it, vital role, provides children with the tools and outlet they may need when their wellbeing, emotional or mental health is below par. During her three years in the role, around a third of children in school have benefitted from her expertise and an even greater number through the application of her skills when working in class.

Our commitment to well-being will not waiver and we proudly build our curriculum model on this: Achieving academic excellence through the acquisition of learning skills and core Christian values

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

Oaks will combat climate change, improve quality of air and life for generations to come.

In addition more trees – any trees - will help absorb water and alleviate flooding.

l urge all Landowners, Farmers, Parish Councils, Gardeners, Residents,

Landscapers and most particularly Developers to engage with the initiative and get 'Carbon Clever' and plant for the future.

Fly tipping & Litter

Fly tipping and littering is still a bugbear and I am afraid has got worse during lockdown. The villages all have very hard-working volunteers doing their best and are very much appreciated.

Rushcliffe have appointed WISE (Waste Investigations Support) to help tackle the problem.

Since January 886 fixed penalty notices have been issued including a £300 fine for a tip at Cropwell Butler.

Just a gentle reminder – If you are having waste removed by an outside contractor make sure you check their credentials and ensure your waste is not going to be dumped at the road side as you then become responsible.

inspect it within 10 working days and either fix it immediately or. if this isn't possible, make the necessary arrangements to do so. For a pothole to be considered a safety defect it must be at least 40mm deep in the road surface or 20mm deep in a footway for us to fix it. Providing it meets these requirements, a pothole will be prioritised for repair depending on its size, depth and road location.

News from Tarmac

For this issue of The Signpost we are delighted to talk about a Tarmacsupported project in Barnstone which was recently completed and opened up for children in the area to enjoy once COVID-19 restrictions allowed.

Thanks to a donation of almost £20,000 from Tarmac's Landfill Communities Fund*, the Parish Council and Play Park Group were able to make the most of the quiet lockdown time to transform the village park and complete Phase 1 of a 'Vision for the Future' of the play area. Phase 1 has included replacing outdated equipment and refurbishing some existing equipment for the 2–11-year-old age group.

We recently went along to see the project for ourselves. It was fantastic to see the new Play Park busy with children really enjoying using all the new equipment. We are delighted that Tarmac was able to support this fantastic scheme through the Landfill Communities Fund, and to see what a big difference it is making to the local community in Barnstone.

We met Stephanie Walker there. She is a local resident and one of the organisers of the Play Park Group. She said: "With so much disappointment for children recently with lockdown and being isolated from friends, it is fantastic that we have been able to provide a new place and something local children can enjoy. We are excited for Phase 2 and to see how we can include the community in the project with the ideas we have."

The Group will now work on finding funding for and progressing with Phase 2 of their Vision which will involve additional climbing and swing equipment to extend the range of play available.

*The Tarmac Landfill Communities Fund (or Landfill Tax Credit Scheme as it was formerly known) enables landfill operators like Tarmac, to donate part of their annual tax liability to enrolled Environmental Bodies for a variety of approved community and environmental projects. Landfill operators can reclaim 90% of their contribution as a tax credit which means the remaining 10% must be provided either by them or an independent third party. Through the fund Tarmac donates around £1 million each year to community projects throughout the UK. The fund is open to applicants who meet the strict criteria for projects delivering community benefit. For more information, please go to www.entrust.org.uk

Your bakes never tasted so sweet

Please can you help The Rosie May Foundation bring some joy into the life of a lonely person?

Have you seen or heard about our Rosie, our little pink Tuk Tuk. Throughout lockdown we have been busy helping out the vulnerable people in our local community by collecting and delivering prescriptions, groceries, fish and chips, Christmas selection boxes and more.

As well as the practical side of things, we realised that just having a visit from the Tuk Tuk and a friendly chat with our volunteer has brought some muchneeded pleasure into the day of someone who otherwise might have had no human contact.

Mary Storrie, CEO and founder of the Rosie May Foundation said "In lockdown one, we quickly realised that the human interaction of a doorstep chat was as important as the prescription or the hot meal we were delivering. People have told us they are anxious about coming out of lockdown and socialising again. School children have said they would prefer to stay at home, rather than return to school. We are unlikely to be able to measure the impact of lockdown on society for generations".

Everyone deserves a chat with a friend. People need people.

We want to continue this by popping in to see people with the gift of a delivery in the form of a **treat and greet**.

Our plan is to visit our local seniors, isolated and vulnerable members of our community and pop by with a slice of cake and check in to see how they are. A doorstep visit is priceless to those people who are unable to get out. Christine, a local resident of Bingham, as seen in the photo with Mary said "*I* felt very lonely in lockdown and I really looked forward to your weekly visits. I am hoping to be able to get to market again soon".

Taxi Voucher Scheme

• The scheme supports residents in Langar and Barnstone with limited financial means who are unable to travel by public transport due to personal mobility problems or rural isolation. The scheme provides vouchers towards the cost of taxi fares.

• Funding for the scheme is limited and we cannot guarantee that everyone who applies will receive vouchers. Those considered to have the greatest need are the most likely to receive vouchers.

• The scheme runs from 1 April to 31 March of the following year (the 'scheme-year') and application to the scheme can be made at any time during the year.

• If your application is approved, a set of £5 vouchers will be given to you for use as part-payment towards the cost of your taxi fare. Twelve vouchers will be issued if the application is approved at the start of the scheme-year, and the number of vouchers issued will be reduced *pro rata* as the scheme-year progresses.

• Renewal forms are sent automatically to members of the scheme to enable them to re-apply each year.

• The vouchers can only be used with the participating taxi operator - Bingham Cabs (01949 831400) - and are subject to the conditions of carriage of the taxi operator. Please inform the driver at the start of the journey if you intend to redeem a voucher.

• The vouchers are not transferable and must only be used by the person to whom they are issued.

• Please note that change will not be given from your taxi vouchers.

• Should unused vouchers be no longer needed, they should be returned as soon as possible to the Parish Clerk, so that they may be allocated to others on the scheme.

• Please be assured that your application will be considered in the strictest confidence by the Parish Council.
