The latest from your Parish Council

Precept for 2022 - 2023

At its meeting in January, the Parish Council formally ratified the sum of £42,158 as its required budget (the 'precept') to provide parish services for the coming year. As ever, the guiding principles used in our discussions were those of trying to maintain support for the amenities and activities that contribute to our strong community spirit, whilst being aware of the need for financial restraint.

This budget requirement represents an increase of 6.7% on the previous year, and this increase is driven almost entirely by increased salary costs for our staff and for those employed by our external contractors following increases in the national minimum wage levels.

Barnstone Bus Shelter

The Parish Council has been in discussion with Nottinghamshire County Council about an upgrade to the Works Lane bus shelter in Barnstone. Our request for a wooden shelter like those elsewhere in Langar and Barnstone was not supported, but a refurbishment of the existing shelter and the fitting of a seat has been approved.

COVID-19 Memorial Bench

The Parish Council has secured funds from Rushcliffe Borough Council (thank you!) for the purchase of a bench as a memorial to the hardships suffered by our community during the COVID-19 pandemic. The bench will be sited on the Works Lane playing field in Barnstone.

Planters in Children's Play Area

The Parish Council wishes to acknowledge the efforts of many in the community in completing the redevelopment of the children's play area with the purchase of two planters, and a donation of bulbs to fill them.

Christmas Tree

The Christmas tree outside the Village Hall drew several positive responses from residents and the Parish Council wishes to thank Derek Harwood of Limes Farm for donating the tree. It is hoped that this Christmas tree display will become an annual feature, with a similar display somewhere in Langar.

Greening the Parish

The Parish Council has received trees from the Rushcliffe Borough Council tree scheme, and they have been planted in the play area, the playing field and at Langar airfield memorial.

Councillor Vacancies

The Parish Council currently comprises seven members, with a wide range of ages, interests, skills and experience. At present, there are vacancies for two additional councillors. If you are interested in finding out more and feel you can offer something to the community, please get in touch.

Nottingham athletes bring home the gold from British Skydiving Championships

A team of skydivers from

Nottinghamshire is celebrating winning the title of British Indoor Skydiving Champions this weekend, following a close battle with the reigning national champions at the event in Basingstoke.

Chimera, which comprises four members from the Vale of Belvoir area, is now the highest ranked indoor skydiving team in the country and is therefore invited to represent Team GB at the upcoming World Cup of Indoor Skydiving, to be held in Belgium in April. Laura Hampton (Bingham), Sarah



Ashworth (Harby), James Woods (Harby) and Will Cooke (Langar) have been competing together for the past seven years, though travel restrictions in recent years have impacted the team's training plans and reduced the amount of time they have been able to spend with their coach, Niklas Hemlin, who resides in the USA.

In spite of this, the team put in an impressive performance at the competition, beating the reigning British champions NFTO and new team Meraki to the top spot. Speaking of the competition, Laura Hampton, who has the position of Outside Centre in Chimera, said: "Winning the gold medal was really a dream come true! Ours is a sport that requires a huge amount of dedication and we've all been working hard to improve our own skills and our skills as a team for years. To be able to say we're the British champions is amazing."

Chimera trains regularly at Nottinghamshire Skydiving Centre Skydive Langar, where over 33,000 skydives were completed in 2021 - in spite of the centre being closed for part of the year through lockdown. Skydive Langar sponsors Chimera and **Operations Manager Josh Carratt said:** "We're very proud of Chimera and so pleased to see their hard work pay off in this way. As well as training at Langar, the team also provides coaching to jumpers, from those learning formation skydiving skills from scratch, to other teams, to larger skydiving groups. We've got an exciting calendar of events lined up for 2022 and it's awesome that some of those are being led by the British champions."







As the storms have highlighted, Postcrete will forever be our mainstay, continuing to present a large proportion of our business, but we are excited to be looking at packing a number of new products over the coming months, cementing (pun intended!) our place in the business as an innovative and forward thinking plant. Whilst the country begins to tentatively peel away the layers of COVID-19

John Harris (the custodian of the website) said 'There is so much



state is enough to put people off, for example, walking to Langar Primary School from Barnstone.

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Langar Church of England Primary School

Being a school governor is a wonderful way to serve and influence the community that you live in. A governing body is made up of volunteers from a variety of backgrounds who contribute to the strategic leadership of the school. Our governing body currently consists of two governors representative of the church, three governors representative of the parent community, one governor representative of the school staff and one governor chosen for their skill set, plus the head teacher. We have a vacancy for a Local Authority governor, a role that is appointed by the Local Authority.

Following Mark Ebb's departure at the end of his seventeen years of service as a governor, we are looking to recruit someone to join our governing body working closely with the Head teacher and staff as we continue to raise standards and support the strategic direction of Langar Church of England Primary School.

You do not have to be an expert in the world of education in order to become a governor; most importantly, you must be able to commit your time as a volunteer to a role that is both challenging and rewarding. You should be motivated and have a willingness to learn new skills and a strong desire to improve the education of young people in our area.

As a Governor you will serve a four-year term of office. You will be required to attend meetings throughout your term of office, contribute to discussions, read up on relevant issues and offer challenge and support to the head teacher. Full governing body meetings are held once a term along with two further committee meetings which focus on Finance and Pupil, Personnel and Strategic matters. Full governing body meetings generally take place between 6.00 and 8.00pm on weekday evenings and are currently undertaken via Zoom and committee meetings are at 6.00pm and held in school. Governors are also required to attend additional meetings when needed or carry out visits during the school day.

We pride ourselves on the close-knit nature of our school, the caring Christian atmosphere and firm focus on learning. Further information about our school and governance structure, can be found on the school website (Governors | Langar C of E Primary School).

Inside A Langar-Barnstone Business

Wildflower Farm (Naturescape)

During our recent visits to deliver the Signpost magazine to all the homes and businesses around the Langar cum Barnstone Parish Council region it was interesting to see just how many different business are operating in the area.

It was thought that it might be of interest to understand just what goes on in the various businesses.



We decided to visit some of the companies to gain an insight and publish the information in the Signpost Magazine which is handed out to every household and business in the area.

As part of this new series of articles for the Signpost magazine, discovering what goes on in the businesses around Langar and Barnstone parish council area, I visited the Wildflower Farm on Coach Gap Lane to meet with Brian Scarborough. The business is owned by Brian and Liz Scarborough and their sons Mark and Tom.

Mark joined the business in 1986 and Tom joined in 2009 making it a complete family business. Tom and Mark are very active in the business and helping it to grow.

The History Behind the Company

In 1978 whilst working at Boots in Nottingham Brian and his wife Liz were walking in the countryside around the area and they both noticed how the number of wild flowers, which used to be seen all over in the farmers fields and hedgerows, were slowly disappearing.

Brian and Liz then took it upon themselves to try to gather seeds from wild flowers that were still remaining.

They took them home to their house in the area and placed the seeds in their airing cupboard to dry.

Once dried out they then proceeded to place them in various seed packets and they were so successful at gathering large quantities they placed an advertisement in the press to try to sell some of the seed packets.

Very soon they were spotted by a company in Boston Lincolnshire called Johnsons Seeds who were supplying seeds to growers and gardeners all over the country for flowers and vegetables but didn't have a wild flower range.

Brian and Liz agreed to work together with Johnsons to develop a wildflower range, with Johnsons offering an insight into packaging and delivery.

This gave Brian the confidence to leave



Boots and further develop the wildflower business.

They purchased a 5 acre plot near Whatton and proceeded to plant hundreds of wildflower plants on their land with a view to collecting the seeds and packaging them and then either selling direct through or through advertisements.

The local garden open day in Whatton coincided with the wild flowers being in full bloom so a lot of local people visited their



fields and were very impressed thus helping the business grow.

The work was all manual and very time consuming however, and they had too many seeds for the airing cupboard so they purchased a drying shed on the land to help.

In 1987 whilst looking to expand a 44-acre plot came up on Coach Gap Lane came up for sale so they took a gamble and purchased the land.

The new land was in a pretty sorry state with concrete all over the place and really overgrown everywhere. Brian remembered

that he used to visit the area with his father when he was young as it was the home of the Canadian Air Force in the war and was quite surprised to be purchasing the area when he was much older.



The Current Site

It took Brian and his family 4 years to develop the Coach Gap Lane site, clearing the land and developing the fields, propagating their own seeds and then planting them to grow and develop, They built a small café on site offering tea and cakes to the people who were visiting for education into wild flowers, as there was an increase in demand.

They made sales through advertising in garden journals and hand packed seeds and sent them by post to their customers.

They planted hundreds more varieties whilst still supplying the ones everyone demanded such as various types of Poppies, Cornflowers, Cowslips etc.

The major changes that have taken place over the years have had a massive impact on their business.

For example -

(The national drive for rewilding and the planning of green spaces around new housing developments)

1 The changes in people's understanding of the environment in their areas and the need to create better environments for wildlife such as the birds and bees and customers wanting to have more natural surroundings.

2 The massive growth of online purchasing where customers can view their requirements and order and pay for them online and have them delivered to their doors.

3 The last two years of COVID have meant that a lot of customers were at home and wanted to improve their gardens and surroundings.

The Company now

The company now employs 40 people in their various areas and they have extended their land by another 76 acres.

They have a number of large wildflower polytunnels for drying out the seeds and planting of wildflower plug plants, which many of you will have walked or driven past and wondered what they were for.

The biggest change is the way the seeds are harvested, sorted, cleaned, mixed and bagged by some very clever machinery which can separate all different shapes, sizes and species automatically. Brian said that when schoolchildren come for educational visits he gives them each a handful of seeds of various types and they are amazed that they can then get them back in their hands all separated and different.

The volumes of seeds available was amazing to see with huge one-ton bags which are supplied around the country to Local Authorities and Motorway contractors.

These can be supplied as special mixes for road sides, around water etc. and as varieties that help to slow down the growth of grass reducing the amount of grass cutting requirements.



Smaller bags are available for golf courses and farmers, down to individual plug plants and individual seed packets which are sold online to anyone who orders them.

The Café has been further developed to be open all day 6 days a week selling a full range of cooked meals, cakes and drinks which sits alongside the wildflower shop selling a range of seeds and plants for all areas and there's always an expert who can be called upon to give growing advice. The Wildflower park is a huge area where you can visit at any time to walk with your children, family or animals and view all the plants and wildlife which are around and there's even a small play area for the children.

Going Forward

To extend their season the company is now growing a range of popular bulbs such as crocuses, snowdrops, blue bells etc. as well as special hedgerow plants to help continue the wild flower environmentally friendly approach.

In Conclusion

You will see from the pictures that I found it amazing that such large and adventurous and forward thinking company, which thinks a great lot about the environment and employs so many staff was operating on our doorstep

I think it is a great place to visit for a walk view the plants or just have a coffee and something to eat, whilst the children play.

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Spring update from the fields around Langar cum Barnstone Parish

We are now entering one of my favourite times of year in the parish as the cows and calves are turned out back to grass and the lambs start appearing in our pastures.

This year, spring is feeling long overdue and brings with it a renewed sense of enthusiasm for the great outdoors. Take time over the coming months to enjoy the fantastic walks and scenery the parish has to offer.

You may have noticed recently that a lot of the field hedges have been cut; this is a job generally reserved for late winter when birds have finished foraging berries left on the hedgerows such as Sloes, Privet and Hawthorn. Legally there is a cut-off date for landowners cutting hedgerows who claim subsidy or are signed up to various environmental schemes which is the end of February. The hedge-cutting season is then closed until September to allow nesting birds the chance to hatch chicks and be safely out the way ready for the open season again.

The winter crops have grown very well this year thanks to a drier than average winter. The clay-based soils that surround the parish are very moisture retentive so a dry winter makes the plants work harder to put roots down; this has benefits later in the summer if it turns dry then the crops have better access to water and therefore nutrients allowing them to yield better (in theory!).

Spring crops will start to be sown as soon as the fields are dry enough to support the weight of a tractor without making wheel ruts. The first crops to be sown will be the cereals which are mainly barley and wheat, although some spring oats are grown locally too. Field beans which are very similar to broad beans you grow in the garden will then be planted; these may be more popular with farmers in the parish this year as the price of nitrogen fertiliser has tripled in a year on the back of the rise in gas prices (most nitrogen fertiliser is made using natural gas) and field beans don't require nitrogen so make for a good economic option.

Some sugar beet is grown locally too and this can be sown from February onwards; the varieties nowadays have been bred to have better cold tolerance and so can be sown a lot earlier than in decades gone by.

Finally the last crop to be sown of any great area will be maize which is used for Anaerobic Digestion (think biological electricity production) or silaged for cattle feed. Maize is a tropical crop and very frost sensitive so is sown from late March through to April on.

Whilst the clay soils are good for producing combinable crops (anything that can go through a combine harvester) they are not easy to cultivate as you'll perhaps be aware from your gardens and so we don't see the variation of cropping like you would in the Lincolnshire Fens where all manner of veg, potatoes, cut flowers and other niche crops can be successfully grown.
