Langar cum Barnstone New Community Hall Official Opening

The Trustees of Langar cum Barnstone Community Hall in Barnstone organised the Grand Opening of their newly-built hall on Saturday 24 February 2024. The new hall replaced the old village hall which was built over 100 years ago.

The Grand Opening was an opportunity to acknowledge all the people and organisations who have contributed or have helped fund the new hall and bring it to its completion.

The Chair of the trustees, Cllr Jeff Fry, officiated at the opening ceremony which was attended by over 200 members of the public from the local area.



The Trustees of the Community Hall were delighted that Steve Odell, the plant manager at Tarmac in Barnstone, unveiled a brass plaque declaring the hall officially open. The

company donated £140,000 towards the new hall through the Tarmac Landfill Communities Fund.

The ceremony was also attended by Cllr Neil Clarke, leader of Rushcliffe Borough Council, Cllr Tina Combellack and Cllr Jonathon Wheeler both from Rushcliffe Borough Council who contributed £15,000 from the Capital Grant Scheme.



Cllr Fry commented "The old hall was built in 1922 by the employees of The Barnstone Blue Lias Lime and Cement Company (now Tarmac). Thanks to the generous funding allocation from Tarmac Landfill Communities Fund, this local business, which is integral to the community, has once again helped to ensure that residents have a safe and welcoming space to come together."



The current user groups of the new hall put on displays for the event. The Art Group showed pictures and photographs, the Brownies put on a display of their work and each of the other groups contributed by showing the visitors what takes place at their events in the hall.



The Parish Council had a table showing the work that the council carries out on a monthly basis and they also made an appeal for new members to join the council as current members retired.

After the official opening ceremony, the Trustees provided tea and coffee and a small buffet for all of those attending and then the visitors were entertained by the Mary Munford Dance Group which meets in the hall every Monday evening.



The new Community Hall can accommodate up to 200 people standing and 96 people seated. It has a large modern fitted galley kitchen with everything you need to facilitate a community event or a party.

There is also a meeting room which holds up to ten people and this can be hired for meetings. There is also a clerk's office. The toilets are accessible and have baby-changing facilities.



Residents of Langar and Barnstone are elated to have a hall back at the heart of their community. The facility has already hosted a Christmas Quiz and an 80s night (both sell-out events) and previous user groups, including the Brownies, Belvoir Archers, Vale Market Café and Vale Arts Group have been excited to move back into the facility. Since December, new users have established themselves at the hall, including a regular yoga class and a singing group.

Langar cum Barnstone Community Hall is available for hire. A warm and welcome venue for all occasions, it is ideal for regular group bookings, meetings, business or training events, celebrations or shows. Mission Impossible Stunt Award for Nottinghamshire Woman

A Nottinghamshire woman is celebrating after her work in Hollywood blockbuster *Mission Impossible: Dead Reckoning* was recognised in the Screen Actors Guild Awards.

Karen Saunders of Newton, Nottinghamshire, was part of the stunt team that helped Tom Cruise launch his motorbike from a cliff and deploy a parachute as part of a thrilling chase scene. Her role was to maintain Cruise's skydiving equipment - a job she holds full time at Nottingham skydiving centre Skydive Langar.

In the film, Cruise is seen making the death-defying leap from the mountain top in a stunt which resulted from years of work and the contribution of a team of subject matter experts to keep the star safe. As the lead parachute rigger at the UK's busiest skydiving centre, and with decades of experience in maintaining parachuting equipment globally, Saunders was selected as Cruise's personal equipment monitor.



Speaking of the role, she said: "It was a real pleasure to work with Tom and the rest of the team behind the movie, which

moments! It's amazing to be able to sit down and watch the final product and to know that millions of people worldwide have seen it too. I'm very proud of it."

Karen Saunders works at Skydive Langar, which is a skydiving centre just outside of Nottingham city centre, where she is responsible for overseeing the proper maintenance of all of the centre's owned equipment as well as providing those services for equipment owned by visiting jumpers. When she's not working with skydivers, she enjoys travelling on her motorcycle and has recently taken up bodybuilding.

With an estimated budget of \$291 million, Mission Impossible: Dead Reckoning is amongst the most expensive films ever made. It has taken \$568 million in box office sales to date.

Two hours free parking in Bingham car parks to be retained in new measures

Discussions to increase the availability of car parking spaces across Bingham's car parks has resulted in two hours free parking being retained as part of new measures from later this year.

Rushcliffe Borough Council's (RBC) Cabinet considered a report at their meeting on Tuesday (April 9) in conjunction with the work of the Bingham Car Parking Strategy Group.

Alternative one hour free car parking plans were discounted in favour of the extended two hour option that will be assessed over twelve months from a date to be confirmed as part of a wider package of the measures.

The Council took into account the views of residents and business owners balanced against the findings of surveys from car park users last year.

Recommendations for free parking for 30 minutes in the bays around the market place were also confirmed to be assessed at the same time, designed to improve parking through encouraging short stay rather than all day parking in the town centre.

In Newgate Street and Needham Street the new car park tariffs from later this year will be:

- Up to two hours free
- 2-3 hours £1
- 3-4 hours £5
- 4-12 hours £10

A Rushcliffe Borough Council spokesperson said: "The meeting discussed the focus on maximising the availability of spaces for short stay users and those who wish to stay longer, in line with data from car park users.

"Now, listening to further feedback from residents and businesses, the two hours free option will be retained from later this year with the needs of shoppers and visitors prioritised.

"The Council has very much placed emphasis on taking on board all the views from all parties to aim to follow an option that will increase the turnover and regularity of free spaces whilst benefiting motorists, local businesses and service providers alike.

"The new tariffs for Newgate Street and Needham Street car parks are being considered alongside meeting the priorities of the Council's Off Street Car Parking Strategy and will be reviewed at the end of the 12 month period.

"Any funds received from car parking only meet the cost of the changes that are required such as new car park machines and contributing to the overall cost of maintaining these car parks."

As part of the package the changes, restrictions on market days will be lifted to allow spaces to be made available when they are not in use by market traders. At Bingham Arena around 30 chargeable spaces will be made available for long stay parking for staff working at local businesses.

Approvals for the new measures to be introduced are expected to take around six months.

The Strategy Group has representatives from RBC, Bingham Town Council(BTC) and Nottinghamshire County Council.

Group members include RBC's Cabinet Portfolio Holder for Environment and

Safety Cllr Rob Inglis, Ward Members for Bingham, Mayor Cllr Rowan Bird and Cllr Norman Mees from BTC and RBC Leader and Nottinghamshire County Council's Cabinet Member for Transport and Environment and Bingham West member Cllr Neil Clarke.

Long Serving Councillor Retires



After serving on the Langar cum Barnstone Parish Council for fifteen years, Councillor Adrian Bellamy has decided that the time has come to retire from his role as a Parish Councillor following the completion of the new community hall.

Adrian and his wife and two children Lucy and Dan moved into the new houses on Butlers Field when they arrived in Langar in June 2000. The children attended Langar school and Adrian soon became a governor at the school starting his commitment to helping in the local community.

Shortly afterwards he set up his own business in the area working in the building industry, fitting out commercial buildings which stood him in good stead for what was to come in the village later.

Parish Council

Adrian became a Parish Councillor in 2009. He attended Parish Council meetings regularly over the years, helping with funding decisions, planning applications, talking with county and borough councillors and generally helping to improve the area around Langar cum Barnstone and the two playing areas.

Adrian became a Parish Councillor around the time that the Parish Council

were deciding what to do with the old village hall which needed updating or replacing as it was in a state of disrepair. It needed a lot of attention, including the worn out electrics, poor quality toilets, out of date kitchen, and the main hall was in a state of disrepair.

There was a lot of discussion about raising funds for the replacement of the hall along with where to build it, with various ideas coming from the local users and villagers.

However, this was all around 2011 when the country was going through financial problems, so everything was put on hold.

In 2013, using Adrian's expertise along with other councillors, it was decided that the best thing to do at the time was to gain another few years' usage of the old hall by rewiring it, building a new kitchen, putting down a new floor to help the dancers, and completely repairing and decorating the main hall.

In the end this work helped the hall to run for another ten years proving, that the restoration work was worth it.

New Replacement Hall

Eventually wear and tear meant that again the old building was deteriorating badly so the Parish Council decided to re-launch the idea of rebuilding the hall. The council then found out that old hall was in a Trust and covenants meant that the old hall had to be replaced in the same position.

Adrian and other councillors entered many discussions with the hall users regarding their future requirements. Many consultations were held with designers and architects and Adrian was able to use his expertise in the building trade to assist in the design and interior fitments etc.

After many deliberations a new design was chosen, and planning consent was sought, and a builder and a contract manager were chosen. The Parish Council then took over the running of the Trust for the village hall, as many of the existing trustees wished to retire and finding replacements was difficult. All of the Parish Councillors became a Corporate Trustee body and were then involved in the discussions about the new build.

At the end of 2022 the building work commenced, and the Trustee group met on a regular basis to discuss ideas and proposals along with agreeing stage payments for the building work. Together with the Chair of the Trustees, Councillor Fry, the trustees met on a regular basis with the architect and the building contractors, giving a lot of individual time to the project until at the end of 2023 the new building was completed and handed over.

With the help of the Parish Council and the Trustees, Adrian's expertise has helped produce a new Community Hall which is a great asset to the local community and the envy of other villages in the area, leaving a long lasting legacy to the Langar Barnstone area.

The members of the Parish Council and the Trustees of the new village hall, together with all the users of the building, would like thank Adrian for his fifteen years' of hard work and wish him good luck with his future ventures in the area.

Inside a Local Business Mary Kirsten School of Dance

History



Mary's family lived in South Africa where her mother and father were ballroom dancing champions. In 1961 Mary's parents decided to leave South Africa and move to Stevenage in the UK, Mary was four years old and immediately

joined a dancing class.

By 1976, at the age of 19, Mary had her teaching qualifications and took over the dancing school where she had been

trained, teaching children of all ages to dance whilst working full time.

In 1982 she left dancing for a while but later came back to it as she was missing it so much.

Whilst still running classes in Stevenage, Mary moved to Cotgrave in Nottinghamshire and continued to work full time. Seventeen years ago she opened a school of dance for all ages at Cotgrave.

A year later, this was followed by another dance school in Barnstone old village hall and then another one in Alford Lincolnshire.

With dancers of all age groups trained by Mary entering competitions around the country and winning, Mary soon became recognised as a dance teacher and became involved in judging dancers both in competitions and for certification around the country including Blackpool Tower Ballroom, The Winter Gardens, Scarborough and even Southern Ireland. Mary says that lately she has been sitting on judging panels where many of the other judges, now the Young Professionals, were judged by her when they were children.



Mary trains children from as young as four in different classes, both privately and in groups. Over the years the Barnstone school has produced twenty British Champions and three UK champions. One as young as 9 years old and some 14 to 15 year olds.

Mary has encouraged many children with special needs to attend the dance school in Barnstone and says it is an amazing way for those children to build up their confidence and then go on to the better things in dancing.

New Community Hall

When Mary heard about the new community hall she worked with the Trustees and the user groups to ensure that the builders installed a good dance floor in the main hall suitable for dancing.

Mary and all her dancers stated that the dance floor is the best one they have ever danced on which means that the new hall meets all the expectations. When the new hall was officially opened Mary's dancing group put on a lovely demonstration for all the visitors to the opening.

Rosie May Foundation

The foundation set up a competition to honour Rosie May who loved dancing. Ten couples, who have never danced before, register to compete and raise funds for the foundation. They are trained over ten weeks by members of the dance school and at the end of the ten weeks they hold a ball and a competition, similar to Strictly Come Dancing, at Kelham Hall in Newark.

The sponsors and guests hold an auction and the dancers, who are usually from sponsoring companies, raise funds as well. This year's competition raised £37,530 for the foundation.

The school of dance holds lessons on a Monday evening and Mary currently has fourteen children in lessons aged from four years to twelve years.



They also hold dancing sessions on some weekends and some of her more senior dancers come to the new hall on weeknights to practise for competitions. Mary's School of Dancing love using the new Community Hall and will be continuing to use it for some time.

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Barnstone Bowls Club Potted History

Barnstone Bowls Club was started in 1963 by three Blue Circle employees who were playing at Bingham Bowls Club. They approached the then Works Manager, Mr Glyn Howe, and finally reached an agreement on where the green would be sited and, if the men would dig out and lay the foundations, Blue Circle would buy the finest Cumberland turf and topsoil.

A specialist firm was engaged to help but mainly to provide advice on how to properly lay a bowling green. That was a very wise decision because, to this day, we have inherited one of the best playing surfaces in the area. The Nottinghamshire County Bowls representative team are considering playing matches here, despite the remote location.

The green and funding were from Blue Circle and initially, membership was restricted to Blue Circle employees, who turned out to be very enthusiastic. They just played friendlies to begin with, but it was the Barnstone Bowls Club committee who founded the Belvoir League circa 1968 and invited other clubs to compete against each other. The Belvoir League is still going strong today and two Barnstone members serve on the League committee.

The construction of Barnstone Country Club right next door in 1970 did nothing to decrease the bowls club's popularity. The Bowls Club opened its doors to everyone, which strengthened the club of course. Many honours have been won over the years but the friendliness of the members has always been maintained.

We have members who travel from Ilkeston, Grantham and Newark, which is testament to that. In the early days it had the nickname 'The Little Big Club'.

Several social events are held each year. For example, The Little Big Club has raised over £50,000 from Tribute Nights for Macmillan Cancer Support. The Country Club was demolished a few years ago so we are now investigating whether it would be feasible to sell alcoholic refreshments on match and club days.

As I write this the days are getting longer, there are occasional blue skies but the rain is still with us. To be honest, the long summer days enjoying the tranquil game of bowls seem a long way off. On the other hand, the snowdrops, daffodils and even a few tulips are showing their colours so spring is definitely on the way, so those beautiful summer days spent peacefully with friends on the bowling green are following close behind.

Five new members have joined us so far this season and have been made very welcome but none of them are from Langar and Barnstone. Three are from Granby, which is not too far away, one from Whatton and one from Thoroton but we would love to see a few 'locals' join us. Do you fancy a go? It's a game where ladies can compete on equal terms with men; 70 year olds can compete with 17 year olds; this makes it a family game. The 2024 season gets underway when the green opens on Monday15 April, subject to the weather of course, with a very informal 'roll up' for members and potential members wanting a try before the season gets fully underway.

Plenty of equipment is available for use by newcomers and teaching and coaching will be available in April for anyone who wants a go. Weekly club sessions will be taking place throughout the season.

Planters in the Park – Carol Courtney



During Covid I enrolled on the RHS course in Horticulture at Brooksby College, Melton. I wanted to experiment with drought-tolerant plants. As climate change seems to be upon us, it makes sense to work with those plants which should fare

well in a hot summer and without too much water. So, this is the thinking behind the planters in the park.

All the plants used should survive a hot, dry summer. Any which become scorched by the sun should return the following year, as glorious as ever because their roots will survive. Whilst most of the plants are perennials, I'm adding a few annuals each year which I grow from seed.

So, look, what can you see in there? Blue fescue, Salvia, Bergenia, Verbena, Anemones, Sedum to name but a few..... there are lots more. Let's see which do best.



Planter at the Bus Stop – Sophie Crowder At the back of the bus

At the back of the bus stop area, I planted some more hardy, bigger evergreens with the intention that they will prosper and fill the area, with little ongoing maintenance needed as it's harder to get to.

A selection of Ceanothus, Hypericum, Brachyglottis Sunshine and Viburnum were included, and around these, behind the seating area of the bus stop and down the 'arms' of the planter are a mix of smaller, relatively hardy perennials including Fushias, Asters, Lavender, Heuchera, Sedum and Antirrhinums. So a feast of colour for the eyes and others are there for their lovely aroma.

Everyone at the bus stop wanted a multisensory treat! Infilled with multiple late summer to Autumn bedding plants, last September it all looked beautiful. October saw the addition of lots of Daffodils, Tulips and Allium bulbs, with the intention that these would gradually bring colour to the area from February to May.

As expected with every new project, some plants have thrived and some need replacing. The bedding plants will need refreshing and it seems the bulbs need to be increased in number to have the wow factor I would love to achieve for the centre of the village.

If anyone is keen to help, then there are the inevitable maintenance jobs to join in with. Next week will see me doing some extensive weeding, but anyone who walks by, and can confidently identify weeds of the future, please pluck them out before they make themselves a home.

Watering in the summer is a daily task, and so if anyone around is willing and able to help, especially on Fridays and Saturdays when my own work life can be a bit distracting, I would really welcome the help.

Langar Pond & Herb Garden – Luke Mazers



Last May the Parish Council asked me, as part of my Lengthsman duties, to look after and maintain the old pond area by the Unicorn's Head. Over the next six months I put in place a system which worked

for the wildlife, plants and public.

I have removed invasive plants, thousands of thistles, and nettles, reestablished the path and green around the benches and tried to create areas of habitat for insects, and wildlife. This also included a compost area to be used around the plants to help sustain the plants. Come mid-summer it was humming with bees, a chorus of frogs, and dragonflies. This year I intend to create more areas of interest as well as keeping the weeds at bay. I'm rather excited by the Parish Council accepting my plans to build a community herb garden here also.

This is for all the community at Langar and Barnstone. Although it will take time to flourish, hopefully by summer enough herbs will be established for you to help yourselves. You should see the beds going in April - as a community project it also needs you!

If you walk past and can spend five minutes weeding the beds or you live nearby and can spare a can of water during summer, we can create something special, in an area I have become very fond of.







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
